According to Tanzania Investment Centre (TIC), investments with Indian interest between 1990-2015 (cumulative) amounted to USD 2.75 billion with 446 companies/institutions, supporting employment for about 55,712 Tanzanians. In addition, in a period of 2007 - 2014 (cumulative) an amount of US\$ 518.66 million has been invested by Indian companies in various EPZs in Tanzania.

President Magufuli orders control of sugar AfDB approves US\$1.1 billion loan for import

In a move to protect local sugar factories, Tanzania's President John Magufuli has ordered authorities to control importation of sugar under special permits. The president's directive comes amid business wrangles between local sugar producers and importers of the commodity, mostly from Thailand, Brazil, India and Indonesia. The President revoked local import permits, which are usually issued to traders to import sugar for domestic consumption. The directive. however, does not affect the EAC mechanism where when a member state has a sugar deficit it can invite other members to export sugar to it. Tanzania requires some 590,000 tonnes of sugar for industrial and domestic uses. Domestic consumption of sugar stands at 420,000 tonnes, while industrial demand stands at 170,000 tonnes per year.

The objective of the project is to support the government in promoting inclusive growth and macroeconomic stability by enhancing economic and financial governance through more effective public financial management and an improved business environment.

The African Development Bank Group (AfDB) support Tanzania's economic transformation towards inclusive and green growth with an indicative concessional resource assistance package estimated at over US Dollar 1.1 billion (Sh 2.2trln) over a five-year period. The support package is contained in the Bank's 2016-2020 Country Strategy Paper (CSP) for Tanzania, which will guide the bank's operations in the country in the next five years. The CSP is built on two complementary support pillars infrastructure development for inclusive and green growth, and strengthening governance accountability for improved competitiveness. The CSP provides for a 2016-2020 cumulative indicative concessional resource envelope of US \$1.1 billion (units of account 791 million). Additional resources will be mobilized from the AfDB window, Africa Growing Together Fund. trust funds, renewable energy financing and co-financing with other partners.
